Task 4: Assess a specific paragraph

The Gang of Four

THEY CALL THEM THE GANG OF FOUR. Secretly of course, in private, in break rooms and conference rooms and over the phone, they call them that in the way that some teachers mock and rage about their students in the staff room at lunch and morning tea. One of the shrinks, a man lumped with two of them, is bursting to tell one of his burdens of their derogatory moniker. When he cannot hold it back any longer, he tells the most vocal member of the titular gang, and in such a way that she believes him to have thought of it then, at that moment. The shrink wants her to think he is clever, because theirs is a battle of wits as much as of wills, and he believes that she delights in making him feel as if he has missed the joke.

Additional questions to consider

- 6 Is the language of *The Gang of Four* very formal, casual or standard? How can you tell?
- 7 Is there any rhythm or repetition to the choice of words? List examples.
- 8 Do you think the main character of *The Gang of Four* will be the shrink or the patient? Would your desire to read the book change if the main character was different?
- 9 Research to find out who the real *Gang of Four* were. List each person.
- 10 Knowing who the real *Gang of Four* were, what do you now think this novel would be about?
