- 9 Do you think the main character in *Going-away present* is male or female? How can you tell?
- **10** Do you think the main character in *Going-away present* is kind or mean, rude or polite, patient or impatient, friendly or unfriendly? How can you tell?
- 11 Do you think anything in *Going-away present* might offend people? Give examples and explain your reasons.
